
 Increase in asylum seekers arriving, starting in 2002


Boat Arrivals 2003 - 2015





Asylum Applications 2004 - 2015





Where are we now?

- Population of migrants and asylum seekers has changed and is changing
- Needs, integration mechanisms, locations of migrants are shifting
- Gender / family contexts are changing

We must change our way of thinking... from a focus on migration to a focus on integration and diversity

Key Challenges

- Integration programmes are few and far between
- Most initiatives are sporadic and short term (often project based with limited timeline and funding
- Most initiatives are not tailored to the needs of particular groups (women, persons with disability)
- Focus tends to be on language learning rather than broader social factors

What happens next?

- Measuring diversity differently taking ethnicity into account, not necessarily nationality – developing strong diversity data
- Sustainable integration measures catering for ongoing diversity
- Mainstreaming 'specialist' services ensuring services are appropriate
- Participation participation of groups in the making of categories, the delivery of services, and in political processes



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
