Role of the CSOs in the fight against corruption

CSOs due to their traditional engagements in variety of sectors, usually engage in:

- Public Awareness Raising
- Wacthdog Investigative actions
- Direct assistance
- Policy monitoring, research and assessment
- Advocacy actions
- Service providers







Assumptions and discourses

- EC discourse: CSOs must cooperate with the governments in order to improve public policies and their implementation. In order to do so, CSOs must create coalitions and cross-sector cooperation.
- Main assumption: Governments as well as other sectors have desire to change, reform, improve and tackle corruption!?





Science and reality warnings:

Mainstream anti-corruption experts' discourse:

 "Asking governments to fight corruption is conflict of interests per se, as they would need to fight themselves."







Dilemma:

 If rational choice of the governments is to "avoid any serious anti-corruption activities" and if assumption that governments are "honest" - is false, where does the discourse - Obligatory cooperation between the Government and CSOs lead us in field of fight against corruption?





Balance of power - the main precondition

- CSOs' advocacy actions and policy consultations in its essence represent the negotiations among the stakeholders.
- First principle for successful negotiations is the balance of power.
- Is there a balance of power among anti-corruption stakeholders in your communities?







Anti-corruption logic

- If distribution of resources is heavily controlled by the governments (political powers) at all levels from municipal to the EU,
- If the policy consultation process is reserved for those that "cooperate" with the governments,
- If the access to media is filtered by the political, financial, economic and sometimes ideological interest,
- If CSOs that are part of such schemes form coalititons,
- What is expected result of such actions?







Is there fight against corruption in the Civil Sector?

- At the very begining anti-corruption agenda has focused on transparency and accountability, leading to more sophisticated actions such as risk assesments and building integrity in public sector.
- However, the CSOs were left out from such trends and there is a significant lack of transparency and accountability among the CSOs.
- Regulation on financing of CSOs from public sources, Civil actions lobbying and advocacy, conflict of interest and incompatibilities is rather non-exsistent.
- Practice to advocate for its own interest (give us money and we will solve problem and say that you - the government - is doing a good job) has become mainstream among the CSOs in Europe.





CSOs - where and who are we?

 Therefore, CSOs have become part of a problem that has lead Europe to one of the worst political, economic and financial crisis in history.





CSOs - who we should be

- Only the strong, ethical, independent and critical civil society supported by the independent media can achieve the status of balance of social powers and lead countries' reforms.
- There is no evidence that any other approach has ever resulted in any kind of sustainable social development.
- Therefore, CSOs have to clean its own sector prior to any development of strategy in fight against corruption or administrative and political reforms.
- Othervise all of the actions will remain to be influenced, if not controlled by the corrupt governments that have only one interest - to preserve the power.
- What can any of us do about this?
