

How Whistleblowers and Journalists Expose Corruption

Pištaljka (The Whistle) was set up in 2010 by a group of journalists who were fired from a government-controlled newspaper after blowing the whistle on censorship and conflict of interest To this day, Pištaljka has published more than 300 investigative stories




How We Work

- Pištaljka allows citizens to post anonymous, encrypted tip-offs
- Journalists investigate tip-offs by using the Freedom of Information Law
- Journalists also investigate on their own, using statements by politicians, public data,etc.
- Only stories based on documents received through the law are published (added protection)

Environment Minister Oliver Dulić


- In December 2010 Pištaljka reveals Dulić's private firm was awarded contracts by
 budget-financed institutions
- Dulić failed to report contracts to the Anti-Corruption Agency, but the Agency decides not to press charges

The Change

- Pištaljka's stories receive attention of a wider audience
- Prosecutors encouraged to take action
- Whistleblower/journalist connection can serve as a basis of an early-warning system against corruption
